## **Assessing Your Pet's Quality of Life**

In pets with a serious illness or terminal diagnosis, observing a decline in their quality of life can be upsetting. For many pets, their symptoms may ebb and flow, resulting in good days and bad days, and it can be difficult to objectively evaluate their wellbeing over time.

The Quality of Life Chart considers many aspects of your pet's life, and can help you visualize the general wellbeing of your pet better. Because all pets are different, certain factors may be more or less important for your pet. In some cases, even one negative symptom (for example, a significant level of pain) may indicate a poor quality of life, even if many other aspects are still positive.

You can reassess your pet's quality of life regularly to help identify trends. Your family veterinarian is also an excellent resource for a quality of life assessment of your pet.
